

# WINTER SAFETY NOTE

Winter is Black Ice time--even when roads are relatively clear, it's possible for this nasty stuff to be about, so be extra careful on curves, below driveways where water often runs off onto the roadway, on bridges, and shady spots. It's an especially good time to remember the old adage, "Keep your eyes on the road" not only figuratively, but literally (along with watching the traffic etc.) And stray leftover salt can be about as gritty and problematic for 2 wheels as sand and small gravel, so watch out for it as well.

# THE WAY WE WERE BACK WHEN--MARCH 2004

Breakfast Ride Report Saturday, February 14, 2003

Yes, I know technically the calendar is still on "winter" for another 5 weeks but it sure felt like spring this fine morning. All week I had been chipping away on the ice on my driveway - by Wednesday it was a two-foot path, by Thursday it was three to four feet wide, and on Friday it seemed like the Autobahn. With the four-wheel driven cages we got lazy and did not have a need to shovel snow.

So I went out on Valentine's day morning (after the usual rites with my three women) for the first time since January 10 when I went to Heritage's open house.

I arrived at Eat-N-Park about ten minutes early. The heated vest worked so well I was almost overcooked by the time I made it to the parkway. PennDot had done a reasonable job on I79 between Bridgeville and the Parkway West interchange. Still makeshift work, but no danger of bending your rims like it had been two weeks earlier.

So I waited and waited in the parking lot. Impatient as I am, at 9:05, I started calling the usual suspects. Ralph Meyer was home but had ice on his driveway and company visiting. No answer at Walt Halaja's. At 9:12 I got dressed and had just put my helmet back on when I remembered to put in my earplugs - helmet off again, earplugs in, helmet on --- and then I saw the familiar RT and Walt pulling in. Great - finally I had some company. Walter's charming wife Mathilde followed in the car and joined us for breakfast. After a good hour of warming up in the restaurant we set out for the ride.

Washington County. Walt had a great map which I used to establish the first waypoint on my ETrex GPS. We headed for the Lyle Bridge about 2 miles north of Bavington at the east end of Raccoon Creek State Park. The ride took us along the old Steubenville Pike parallel to Rt. 22. Due to the limitations of my GPS that has hiking topos loaded (I'm waiting for the next sale at EMS to finally buy the Roads and recreation CD) we missed the nicely paved road and instead took a turn at Bavington that soon turned into a dirt road. OK, dirt we can handle, just slow and steady, and keep both feet on the pegs. No biggie.

Then dirt changed into remnants of snow and ice. Still, we thought we could handle that. There was enough dirt mixed with melting snow and we were able to avoid the icy puddles. Easy on the throttle and the brakes..

At one point we passed an area where the road was cut into the hillside. Steep cliff on the left, and a vertical wall on the right. The wall was covered with ice, and so was the road. Luckily, everything was level so we inched forward, with speeds as low as 0.5 mph and not exceeding 2.2 mph (documented by my GPS).

The map showed a right turn but we encountered solid ice - this looked impassable for sure. Walter went to a house to inquire with the locals. No, that bridge has been out for 20 years, and the road is icy and a steep downhill. No way to ride it.

We decided to track back to the intersection and continue straight instead of turning right. That road was pretty steep also but no problems with ice. The dirt had softened up to mud in many places but it was entirely rideable. Piece of cake for the GS girls and boys but with our road tires things weren't so stable. Anyway, we kept the rubber down, and after another 1.5 miles we found the Lyle Bridge that

crosses Brush Run, a tributary to Raccoon Creek. The final half mile was again a steep descent, slippery but free of ice and snow except for the ditches along both sides of the road. GPS N40 27.258 W80 22.539 for those of you that are ambitious.

Thinking "no traffic here", we parked the bikes under the bridge and took pictures, propping the camera up for a self-timed shot. As soon as we had taken the picture, a pickup truck arrived so we needed to move the bikes. I rode to the side of the road and parked my bike on the sidestand while Walt was pushing his RT out of the way to let the truck pass. As I got back on my bike I found out that I had maneuvered myself a bit close to the icy ditch. Being on an uphill grade, I was not able to ease out the clutch without slipping my rear wheel. The tail went sideways toward the ditch and I layed the bike down to prevent the wheel from dropping into the ditch all the way. This would have been a tough situation for me to get out by myself but with Walt's help, we picked the bike up and pushed it back on the road where I was able to ride back up the hill. Thanks to the R engine with its jugs sticking out, no damage to any Tupperware or signals, mirrors etc.

We returned to Steubenville Pike via the nicely paved road that we had missed earlier. Lots of loose gravel on it, but much easier compared to the dirt roads.

Next stop was Hanover Township Park right along the Pike. Walt was familiar with the McClurg Bridge that the Township had saved from Devil's Den and relocated in the Park. The park is fenced in and locked at all times (why?) but we found a large hole in the fence at the backside. This bridge is an easy one to find, GPS N40 25.432 W80 26.809.

The next target was Jackson Bridge, about 1.5 miles north of Rt. 22 and 1.5 Miles east of the WV state line. We turned off from the Pike too early and got stopped by solid ice on the road once again. Walter inquired with a local and got directions - and again, he was told that the bridge we looked for was long gone.

We took the next right turn off the Pike onto Phillips Road that later turns into Kings Creek Road. Jackson Bridge is right on the road as it crosses Kings Creek (which runs west to the Ohio), GPS N40 25.435 W80 29.344. Easy to find and easy to get to, good roads yet lots of loose gravel.

After the picture we continued north along McKraken Hill Road, taking a right at a T-intersection about 1.3 miles north of Jackson Bridge. Dirt roads again, but no problems with snow and ice. To get to Ralston bridge crossing Aunt Clara Fork of Kings Creek, we needed to make a sharp left about 800 ft past the intersection and continue downhill for about 0.4 miles. We parked the bikes and walked the final 300 ft to the bridge for our picture since the road was closed and completely iced over. GPS N40 26.826 W80 30.418. Walter thought that this was a King post bridge - a single pair of posts supporting it in the center.

We returned to Steubenville Pike past Jackson Bridge along the same road that we had come and then continued east and north on Rt. 18 to Frankfort Hot Springs. This was a cache site last year but Walter wanted to show me the springs in the winter. What a sight! The cave is lined with a curtain of huge icicles that cover the entire spring and the surrounding hillside. The creek had washed out the walkway in several places and the path was mostly iced over. We were able to walk into the cave and admired the sunlight hitting the ice curtain. Too bad that Walter's camera battery gave out and we could not get a picture.

We returned to our bikes and rode back south on Rt. 18, taking a left on St. Rt. 3042 to Rt. 30 and back to Steubenville Pike. We both were glad to have done this ride - motorcycling at its finest, as Walt said.

# 2013 DINER HUNT

2013's Diner Hunt was a nice addition to the other Hunts the club has sponsored: Caches, Covered Bridges, Post Offices A to Z, and so forth. The Black Diamond Beemers of Eastern Pennsylvania also sponsored a 'Hunt For' contest the other year, as has our sister Cleveland Club each year. Hunt-fors are excellent club activities, even though not all members participate. They provide several advantages that a lack of them deprives riders of a certain amount of fun. They foster a gentle spirit of competition among members of course, but their major benefit is to provide an always available answer to the question, "Where might we ride to today?" For the inquisitive they offer an opportunity to do a bit of mapping research on-line or in gazeteers or other places to locate the objects in question. Thus 'Hunt-fors' provide a more interesting riding approach than mere 'going out and riding around' when one has nothing better to do and nowhere to go. In short they always provide riders who love to roll 'somewhere to go.' Add to that the fact that the objects sought are to be found in all kinds of locations over all kinds of roads through all kinds of city and country-scapes and it's no wonder that those of us who actually like to ride instead of just polish and look at our bikes like them.

This past year 2013, the objects to be found were those ubiquitous down-home, often homely, but equally often cuisinely delicious eateries that style themselves as 'Diners' or 'Dinors.' Supposedly a cut below, and relatively less fancy than places that style themselves restaurants, these humble eateries often provide not only substantial, but delicious, yet inexpensive sustainence highly favored by those in the know who frequent one or another of them. I've known folks who literally travel miles to get to a favorite diner simply because the food, the service, and the prices are so good, but particularly the food: you'll never, it seems, find a well-populated diner whose food is merely ho-hum even if it's just ordinary, down-home American vittles. Find a well-populated diner and you're invariably in for a good meal at prices that won't break the bank.

Usually people know of one or two diners near their locales, so it was interesting this year to discover exactly how many riders could actually find. Our three Diner Contest Winners this year were Walt Halaja, Don Chembars, and John Humphrey, in first, second, and third place respectively.

The requirement was that for a diner to be counted, the rider had to provide a picture of the diner with him or herself and/or their bike in the photo. These could be either mailed using the USPS or emailed using one or another of the common electronic picture formats, such as .jpg, .tiff, or .bmp. The pictures were collected in a computer folder or directory and the number and dates of each set coming in for a rider kept in a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet.

It was interesting watching the number of pictures found mount up. Pretty soon it became apparent that we had a couple of real riders out there, as watching their totals increase was not unlike watching one of those famous Mississippi Steamboat races in which one boat would pull ahead of the other sometimes by a fair piece, only to have the other come charging past when the first put in for wood or coal or to discharge passengers and freight. At the beginning, I had thought one might run up at the outside, maybe ten or twenty or so diners by the end of the year. My mistake. That many had been found and photographed in but a few months, the last pictures coming in in November whence we had a couple of sets of nice decent riding days. I figured December would mark an end of anything. The weather turned poorly, and I knew Walt, our number one finisher in the end, was going to be in Germany visiting his wife, Mathilde's, family all month long and over New Years. Ha. I forgot that Mathilde had an iPad, and that, having ridden many miles in the past with Walt, he had an eye that would spy things that I had never even seen were there. Sure enough, in mid month, there he was, in a picture identified as "taken by my iPad" (Apple always sticks their advertising on stuff no matter what) with Walt proudly in front of a, would you believe it, German Diner—yep, the sign said 'Diner'. I didn't even know they had the things in dem Vaterland! Then too, I figured there would be a hiatus in the flow of found eateries from Don and Kim Chembars, as they headed South to Florida for, I think, a couple of weeks. I think they may have been attending one of the big rallies down there. In any event it was not long after they had headed down that Don began sending me shots of Floridian Diners! The hunt was on there as well! Terrific!

And despite how busy John and Marge Humphrey were not only with the club's finances and other professional activities, they none-theless were out there and kept up a once-in-a-while flow of pictures throughout the year as they had opportunity to get out and hunt.

By November I was sure the winner would be either Don or Walt, given the number of diners they had racked up. The final score came to 80, 69, and 15 for Walt, Don, and John. I must admit that I never knew there were that many Diners to be found—even those just in Pennsylvania! Rick Sebak, one of of WQED's delightful producers, once did a neat PBS program on diners, and I thought he had found a bunch. But he had nothing on our BMW riders, though I must admit that our riders seem mostly to have photographed them and gone on, whereas Rick appears to have often sampled their wares!

# PRESIDENT SIGNS AGRICULTURAL ACT THAT ENDS SUBSIDY FOR THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF

# ETHANOL BLENDER PUMPS FROM THE AMA

PICKERINGTON, Ohio — The Agricultural Act of 2014 signed into law by President Barack Obama today contains a provision that helps deter distribution of E15 fuels into the U.S. marketplace. The American Motorcyclist Association considers this farm-bill provision a major victory for the owners and riders of the estimated 22 million motorcycles and all-terrain vehicles currently in operation. Those vehicles could be damaged by the use of E15 fuel, a gasoline formulation that contains up to 15 percent ethanol by volume. Also, use of E15 can void owners' vehicle warranties.

The Agricultural Act of 2014, which extends through 2018, prohibits the use of Rural Energy for America Program grant money to purchase and install ethanol blender pumps to dispense E15 at the retail level. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack intended to use REAP funding to install 10,000 blender pumps by 2016.

"It is gratifying to see our efforts on behalf of U.S. motorcyclists and ATV riders achieve this level of success," said Wayne Allard, AMA vice president for government relations. "We plan to continue to monitor the E15 issue, including the Environmental Protection Agency's proposal to reduce the 2014 requirements under its Renewable Fuel Standard."

The AMA has worked since 2011 to prevent the distribution of E15 fuels, seeking independent scientific tests on their effect on motorcycle and all-terrain vehicle engines and fuel systems. After the introduction of E15 into the marketplace, the AMA fought its spread, because of concerns about inadvertent misfueling at blender pumps.

Although the EPA has approved E15 use in 2001-and-newer light-duty vehicles, which include cars, light-duty trucks and medium-duty passenger vehicles, the EPA has not approved its use in any motorcycles or ATVs.
